Visit to Helen Dillon's Garden, 45 Sandford Terrace, Ranelagh, Dublin

There can be few Irish gardeners who are not aware of the Dillon Garden and we are delighted to be able to pay another visit this month. It is one of those gardens that never

fails to satisfy no matter how many times you visit. In case you have fallen from another planet and have somehow missed out on the Dillon Experience, this little summary from House & Garden magazine will give a flavour of what to expect:

'Helen Dillon is the undisputed queen of Irish gardening. Her acre of town garden in the elegant Ranelagh district of Dublin has become the most photographed garden in Ireland - seen both in magazines and in the many books she has written - and she is known for her relaxed, sometimes unorthodox style of gardening and her spirited views. Helen is the kind of person who absolutely hates being categorised - she won't be pinned down to a particular style or approach, and confesses that her tastes are constantly changing. In her view, gardening should be an entirely intuitive process. 'Creative things happen when you're not thinking about something; you're just playing,' she says. GARDEN VISIT – Ringdufferin House, Co. Down.

A visit to Tracy Hamilton's historic walled garden at Ringdufferin House on the banks of Strangford Lough to see the impressive Rhododendron collection.

An additional feature of the garden is the Monterey Cypress (*Cupressus macrocarpa*) which is the tree with the greatest girth of any tree in Ireland at 12.65 metres, and was planted in the late 19th century (it is described in Aubrey Fennell's '*Heritage Trees of Ireland*'). This, together with a fine collection of other specimen trees, makes this a visit not to be missed.

LOCATION. Take the A22 South towards Killyleagh from the roundabout on the Comber Bypass. Proceed through Lisbane and Balloo and at 8.9 miles turn left into Ringdufferin Road. Keep straight on for 0.8 miles and the gates to the estate are on your right (facing a large brightly painted building – a Nursing Home I believe)

'Fota House Annual Plant and Garden Fair' at Fota House and Gardens, Cork

This is now recognised as the biggest Plant and Garden Fair outside the Dublin area and will again be held in the new Car Park of Fota House.

It is expected that seventy or eighty specialist nurseries will attend and provide an opportunity for visitors to purchase unusual and special plants, including rare Trees, Shrubs, Alpine, Herbaceous and Water Plants etc. at reasonable prices. Retailers providing Garden Furniture, Pots, Sculptures, Ornaments and Tools will also attend, thus enabling the people to buy everything they need for their Gardens. A competition for most attractive stand will also be held which has been won in previous years by Hillside Nurseries, Deelish Garden Centre and Rare Plants Ireland

The Fair will run from 11.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. and catering facilities will be available in Fota House and on site throughout the day.

There will also be an opportunity for those attending to walk around the beautiful Gardens and Arboretum at Fota and to visit the newly renovated Fota House and see the collection of pictures which represents the third most significant public collection of Irish art in the State.

For all those with an interest in Gardening, this is an event not to be missed. Volunteers from Fota House and from the Friends of Marymount Hospice will assist with the running of the Fair and a substantial donation will be given to this very worthy charity.

AGM WEEKEND GARDEN VISITS

The owners of two of the gardens are very private people and we are delighted to get a rare opportunity to visit their gardens in Howth. One has been described by a committee

member as being perhaps 'one of the most beautiful gardens in the world'. It is a garden designers dream, incorporating house and garden in a unified whole. Nestling in a bowl on the summit of Howth Head, this relatively young garden is divided into rooms including an area of exotics, a vegetable garden, themed borders in warm and cool colours, a water feature leading to a copse of birch under-planted with a collection of spring bulbs, and a rocky outcrop with a selection of choice alpine specimens.

The other, on the southern side of the Howth peninsula, boasts extensive views of Dublin Bay. It is a gardener's paradise with lots of mature trees, beautifully designed borders with a combination of hardy and tender perennials. Walkways wind their way through both formal and informal planting patterns. Due to its location, there are some steep steps in parts of this garden.

The gardens at Malahide Castle are well known to many of us, but it's always good to get a guided tour of such a special place. Our guide on this occasion is Kevin Halpenny, Senior Parks Superintendent of Fingal County Council. The gardens were largely created by Lord Milo Talbot from 1948 to 1973. Renowned for their plant collection of almost 5000 taxa with a particular emphasis on Southern Hemisphere plants, the gardens cover an area known as the West Lawn – 6.6ha (18 acres) of shrubbery and a walled garden of 1.6 ha (4 acres). The West Lawn collection includes *Nothofagus*, *Pittosporum*, *Berberis*, *Hoheria*, *Syringa*, *Escallonia*, *Deutzia* and the NCCPG collection of *Olearia* which now includes 55 species and varieties. The walled garden includes many tender and rare species. Here, seven glasshouses ranging from a small Victorian display house to an elegant Victorian conservatory added in the 1990s. Plants of note in the walled garden include *Eucryphia milliganii*, *Acradenia frankliniae*, species of *Bomarea* surviving outdoors and a range of *Passiflora* species of which *P. antioquiensis* is most stunning.

Apart from visits to gardens, Dr Mary Forrest of UCD School of Horticulture and Landscape Architecture, and author of '*Trees and Shrubs Cultivated in Ireland*' will lead us on the Rhododendron Walk immortalised in James Joyce's *Ulysses*. The walk takes us around the western side of Howth Summit, adjacent to the golf course with views to the city and airport, and northwards to the Mournes. Starting at the Deer Park Hotel, we will view the 20th century planting by the Gainsford St Lawrence family who still own this area. Sturdy footwear is recommended for this walk due to uneven terrain. Heavy rain may also curtail this walk.

As an alternative to the Rhododendron walk, for those who may have difficulties with the uneven terrain, we have the opportunity to visit the allotment gardens of Lorna and David Hopkins. These proved very popular when we last visited a couple of years ago and for those living some distance from the area who may not have been able to attend the last time, we are pleased to get the chance of a follow up visit. Located on the eastern side of Howth Head, these are allotments with a difference. First there is the view; from close to the cliff face overlooking Ireland's Eye and Lambay island there are views over the harbour. One of the allotments is owned by *Aqua*, a restaurant on the pier, proving that their vegetables and herbs are super fresh. Then there are the animals ... pigs, hens and now an apiary. The allotments have plenty of interest and hopefully some of the other owners will also be on hand to have a chat during our visit.
